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April 25th is ANZAC Day

HAVE YOU NOTICED a different flag flying at the Royal Canadian Legion this week? On loan from ANZAC veteran Lloyd Betts, the flag is flying to commemorate ANZAC Day which, since its inception in 1916, recalls a significant chapter in the British Commonwealth's military history. To an Australian or New Zealander, ANZAC Day is one of their most important national occasions.

Every April 25th, both countries, as well as their fellow Commonwealth nations, honour the members of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps (ANZAC) who fought at Gallipoli in the Ottoman Empire (now Turkey) during World War I.

Gallipoli was the first major military action fought by Australian and New Zealand forces during the First World War. Although the campaign ended in defeat for the Allies, the soldiers in those forces quickly became known as ANZACs, and the pride they took in that name endures to this day.

Over the year years, ANZAC Day changed to more broadly remember and honour all those who served and died in military operations for their countries.



When World War 1 broke out in 1914, Australia had been a federal commonwealth for only 13 years. The new national government was eager to establish its reputation among the nations of the world.

In 1915, Australian and New Zealand soldiers formed part of the allied expedition that set out to capture the Gallipoli peninsula. The strategic objective was to open the Dardanelles Strait - and access to the Black Sea - to the allied navies. The ultimate objective was to capture Constantinople (now Istanbul), aiming to force the Ottoman Empire, an ally of Germany, out of the war.

The ANZAC forces landed on Gallipoli on April 25th, and were met with incredibly fierce resistance from the Ottoman Turkish defenders. What had been planned as a bold stroke to

quickly knock Turkey out of the war mired down to become a stalemate, and the hard fought campaign dragged on for eight long and bloody months. At the end of 1915, the allied forces were evacuated, after both sides had suffered massive casualties.

Although the Gallipoli campaign failed in its military objectives, the Australian and New Zealand actions during the campaign left a powerful legacy. The creation of the "ANZAC legend" became an important part of the identity of both nations, shaping the ways they viewed themselves, their history and their future.

The 25th of April was officially named ANZAC Day in 1916, marked by ceremonies and services and a march by over 2,000 Australian and New Zealand troops through the streets of London, where one London newspaper headline dubbed them "the Knights of Gallipoli". Marches were held all over Australia and New Zealand, with convoys of cars carrying wounded soldiers from Gallipoli, attended by nurses. For the remaining years of the war,

ANZAC Day was an occasion for patriotic rallies, parades and recruiting campaigns.

With the coming of the Second World War, ANZAC Day also served to commemorate the lives of ANZACs who died in that war. In subsequent years, the meaning of the day has been further broadened to include those killed in any military action, as well as to honour the service men and women who returned. During the war however, the services were limited in their scope, since the government prohibited large public gatherings in case of a Japanese air attack.

Unlike Remembrance Day services, which normally take place at 11 am on the 11th day of the 11th month, ANZAC Day services are held at dawn – the time of the original landing. Other ceremonies and services follow later in the day.

The Dawn Service observed on ANZAC Day has its origins in a wartime military routine which is still followed today. Since the faint light of dawn is one of the best times for an attack, soldiers in defensive positions were woken in the dark before dawn, so by the time first light crept across the battlefield they were awake, alert, and manning their weapons. This is still known as the “stand-to”. As dusk is equally favourable for attacks, the stand-to is repeated at sunset.

The dawn service was originally limited to veterans, while daytime ceremonies eventually followed for their families and other well-wishers. Before dawn, the gathered veterans would be ordered to “stand to” and two minutes’ silence would follow. At the end of this time a lone bugler would play the Last Post and then conclude the service with Reveille, the bugler’s call to wake up.

Firefighters “Swarm” Hilton Beach

RESIDENTS OF HILTON BEACH were no doubt wondering what disaster might have befallen their village last Saturday, as the Waterfront Centre and Marina dockside areas filled with emergency vehicles, manned by teams of firefighters dressed for action in bunker suits.

It was actually a live training exercise being conducted as part of the weekend’s Algoma Mutual Assistance Conference, which was headquartered at the Community Hall. Hosted by the Island’s three fire departments, the 3 day conference was attended by personnel from throughout Algoma.

While some attendees took part in “classroom” update and instruction activities, others braved Saturday’s cold weather for some live action, dealing with an intricate problem that faces every rural fire department where there are no hydrants nearby: keeping a steady supply of high pressure water on a fire, where there might not be room to bring all of the necessary equipment to bear.

Using equipment provided by our island fire departments, the group broke into three ‘teams’, each with a specific task: Group A manned 3 large ‘porta-tanks’, from which one fire truck drew water, then pumped it hundreds of meters to Group B, located at the Marina shore, who actually “fought the fire.”

A constant water supply was provided by two tanker trucks shuttling back and forth, dumping their loads into the porta-

Maybe the Rhubarb will come up soon...

Spring Rhubarb Coffeecake

2 cups flour
1 cup sugar
4 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp. salt
1 egg

1 cup yogurt (plain or vanilla if you like it sweeter!)

1/4 cup unsalted butter, melted

2 tsp. vanilla extract

2 cups rhubarb, chopped into 1" pieces

Topping:

1/4 cup brown sugar

1 Tbsp. flour

1/2 tsp. cinnamon

1 Tbsp. unsalted butter, at room temperature

Preheat oven to 350°F. Butter and flour an 8" round spring-form pan. In a large bowl whisk flour, sugar, baking powder and salt. In another bowl beat egg, yogurt, melted butter and vanilla until fluffy. Stir into flour mixture until blended. Batter will be stiff. Stir in rhubarb. Spread into prepared pan and smooth top. Combine brown sugar, flour and cinnamon. With your fingers work together until crumbly. Sprinkle over cake batter. Bake 45-50 minutes. Serve with ice cream.

tanks, then returning to the dockside, where Group C refilled them with the precision of a Nascar pit crew, using portable pumps drawing water from holes they had drilled in the harbor ice. And it was all done by crews from several different departments, who were not accustomed to working together.

Then, just when everybody had it all down pat, they all switched roles!

It was not only valuable training in the logistics of supplying water over long distances and fighting fires in tight spaces; it was also an endurance test for personnel and equipment. Once the three teams got set up and their efforts synchronized, they collectively managed to keep it all going, delivering a steady stream of high-pressure water to the 'fire' for well over two hours non-stop. That's a LOT harder than it sounds!


