
Dermot and Connor grinningly whispered in my ear one fine day that Mrs. McCluskey had put her foot down and demanded that



With great trepidation, Dermot, Connor and I cautiously approached Mr. McCluskey, our senses alert and twitching, to pick up any hint of his current mood. Dermot had drawn the short stick, so it fell to him to speak on behalf of our delegation. It didn’t go well. Mr. McCluskey made it very clear that no sons of his would touch that cursed car and, turning his white hot fury on me, uttered “Well boyo, if you’re so smart as to want this wreck, you’ll be buyin’ it yerself! My fine boys will have none of it!” he raged.

My own righteous anger boiled up and, just like an erupting volcano, I blurted out “Fine! I’ll buy it myself!” I clearly broke through Mr. McCluskey’s defenses because he stopped, thought for a second, then offered his hand. “Done!” he roared. “Done!” I roared in return, after which I stopped, thought for a second myself then sheepishly asked “How much did I buy it for?” “How much have you got?” he purred silkily. “I’ve got \$100 saved up that I’m planning to ...” “That’ll do nicely!” he interrupted. We shook hands and exchanged boisterous “Dones!” once again. I ran home to fetch the money, hoping that my parents wouldn’t ask what I was up to. On my speedy return, Mr. McCluskey shook my hand again, clapped me on the back, handed me the key and shooed me on my way with my new car.

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
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## Young Entrepreneurs, Make Your Pitch!
