In 1998, a group of seniors decided that they would form a Carpet Bowling league on St. Joseph Island. In 2025, the bowling league is still going on.

They had two 30’ carpets and two sets of black and brown balls from an earlier Seniors Social Club and the Legion Hall in which to play. The floor there is flat but has unusual dips in unsuspecting places that adds a little uncertainty as to where the balls will end up. On top of that, the balls are biased which means they are weighted on one side indicated by the markings on the ball and will curve according to how you presented the ball. The aim is to get closest to the white Jack ball which is thrown first. Very close decisions need a tape measure.

Since 1998, membership has fluctuated from 8 to 16 on a given Monday. Teams of 4 are picked and two

## ST. JOSEPH ISLAND MUSEUM MOMENT

Over the past couple weeks I have written about harvest time for the pioneer. In addition to the work of crop harvesting there were other necessary tasks the pioneer must do before winter. Candle making was one of those tasks. Candles provided portable light and were essential for the winter. Before electricity or widespread kerosene lamp use candles were a daily necessity for providing light for evening chores, reading, spinning and caring for the children long after the sun set. The candle making process was a task that was almost always done in the autumn, it was a way to use otherwise discarded items. After the livestock were butchered there was plenty of fat to use, and the cooler weather made it easier to store this rendered fat. The most common material used was fat called tallow. The fat from cattle, sheep or pigs was rendered down and strained to remove impurities. Tallow candles burned with a dim light and often produced smoke and odour but they were practical and accessible. In areas where beekeeping or wild hives were, the wax could be harvested. Beeswax candles offered a superior alternative. These candles burned longer, cleaner and had a pleasant scent, though because the wax was harder to obtain these candles were often reserved for special occasions. The candle making process was labour intensive but didn't require many tools, usually just a kettle, strainer or cloths to clean the tallow, wicking material usually linen, cotton or hemp, dipping sticks and candle moulds were all that were needed. The most common method was the dipping process, hand dipped candles were made in batches and required patience. Wicks were cut to length and tied to a stick or rod. Wicks were dipped briefly into the kettle of melted tallow or wax and then hung to cool and harden. Each wick was dipped repeatedly, often 20-30 times until the candle reached the desired thickness. Once finished, the candles were trimmed and stored in bundles. If the pioneer family owned a metal candle mould the process was quicker and the candles were more uniform. Wicks were threaded through the mould and anchored at one end. Melted tallow or beeswax was poured in and left to cool. Once the wax was hardened the candles were gently pulled out and the wick trimmed. Candles were very precious and needed to be stored properly. Candles needed to be kept away from the heat of the hearth and direct sunlight. They were often kept in a cool dry place in a wooden or tin box or hung in bundles. The bundles were hung from rafters, ceiling beams or hooks in the kitchen to keep them away from rodents and insects. Tallow candles were prone to melting, bending or going rancid if stored improperly. They were used sparingly, one candle might light an entire room if

set next to a reflective surface like a tin or a polished metal plate. Pioneer candle making illustrates the resilience and resourcefulness of early settlers. With limited tools and materials they created essential light for their home. Today, museums and heritage programs keep this tradition alive reminding us how everyday survival once relied on skilled hands and shared knowledge

## Central Algoma Land Trust News Release

For the second year in a row, the Central Algoma Land Trust is proud to partner with Parks Canada to host the Fall Migratory Bird Day at Fort St. Joseph National Historic Site. Parks Canada will be providing special access to the site so that birders can experience the wonders of fall bird migration.

The site will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 4:00 p.m. on Saturday October 11, 2025.

Fort St. Joseph National Historic Site, which is also home to the St. Joseph Island Migratory Bird Sanctuary, is well known as a top tier birding location within the Algoma District. Over 220 different bird species have been recorded here over the years, including 172 so far this year.

During mid-October, a variety of migratory birds can be seen in a single day, including many ducks, raptors, and songbirds. The almost 1000-hectare bird sanctuary has 4.3km-worth of hiking trails that can be explored, and the ruins of Fort St. Joseph offer a great vantage point out over the open water of Lake Huron.

This event is open to everyone, from experienced birders to those looking to try out the hobby for the first time. If you don't have your own pair of binoculars, you can rent a pair from Parks Canada for \$5 per hour. Carter Dorscht of the Central Algoma Land Trust will be present in the ruins area for the day to help point out birds.

Admission fees of \$4.50 per adult and \$4.00 per senior are applicable (youth age 17 and younger are free). Washrooms will be available within the visitor centre. Water will be available for participants to fill personal water bottles, and a limited supply of ice-cream, snacks and beverages will be available for purchase. Participants are encouraged to bring their own food and drinks to ensure they have everything they need to enjoy an amazing day of birding as the nearest food service is roughly 30 km away.

Fort St. Joseph National Historic Site is located at 185 Fort Road on St. Joseph Island.

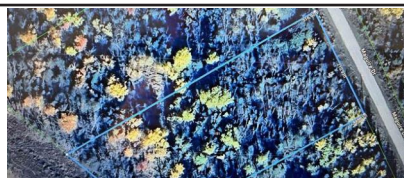

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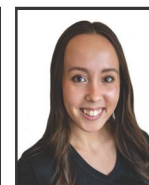
